"SLEEPING BEAUTY" A FAIRY TALE IN 3 ACTS

THE STORY

In their palatial residence the King and Queen of Fairyland invite the Good Fairies of their Kingdom to a magnificent feast in celebration of the birth of a little daughter. At the end of the day each fairy led by Love comes forward and bestows on the tiny child a gift. 


